

# **QUARTERLY REPORT**

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## **Introduction**

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This report provides an overview of the Greymond Foundation's activities for the first quarter of year 2025, highlighting its ongoing commitment to providing educational opportunities for underprivileged students. Building on the remarkable success of 2024, when the foundation not only enrolled 30 out-of-school youngsters but also paid academic fees for 20 in-school children, this year's efforts focused on sustaining and expanding that impact.

In 2025, the foundation continued its impactful work by focusing on the payment of school fees, covering junior secondary school national examination registration fee, senior secondary school national and West African examinations registration fees, and conducting regular check-ups on beneficiaries to monitor their academic progress and well-being. These reflects the foundations dedication to empowering students through education and ensuring they receive the necessary support to succeed.

## **Programs and Activities**

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Key activities undertaken by Greymond Foundation between January and March 2025, focusing on compilation and payment of school fees, examination registration fees, and beneficiaries update are as follow:

### **A. Payment of Second Term School Fees**

In January 2025, the foundation compiled and processed the second term school fees for her scholarship beneficiaries. On the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January 2025, Payments were made directly to the schools.

Following the disbursement, the program officer conducted school visitations on January 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>, 2025 to acknowledge payment for school, junior and senior national examination fees. The visit spanned across Lugbe, Kuje, Mpape and Nyanya Axis. While some schools acknowledged the payment and issued receipts promptly, others required follow-up visits. All payment was acknowledged, receipt were given except for PTA receipts for senior secondary school mpape. The school issued School Fee receipt but could not issue PTA receipt due to alert issue with the school account. This particular receipt will be collected when the school resumes for third term. All beneficiaries were duly informed of the payments and they resumed school, attended classes and wrote exams without hindrance.





## **B. Payment of Junior and Senior WAEC /NECO Registration Fees**

Beneficiaries in their final year of junior secondary school (JSS 3) were required to register for the National Junior Secondary Transitional Examination. Registration fees, which varied across schools, were included with their school fees and paid directly to the institution. The following students had their fees paid:

During school visitation, it was discovered that two additional students were eligible for the same examination. The foundation made additional payment on the 10<sup>th</sup> of February 2025, to cover their registration. Below are their names:

At the Senior Secondary School (SS3) level, only one student, Blessing Odey, was in her final year. Her NECO and WAEC registration fees, along her school fee, were paid on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January 2025.



### **C. Replacement of Two Beneficiaries**

During the fee compilation process, the foundation was notified by the guardians of w=two existing beneficiaries of their intention to withdraw from the scholarship. One family was

relocating out of state, while the other had experienced an improvement in their financial situation and could now support their child independently. The name of the beneficiaries withdrawn are:

They were replaced by the following beneficiaries:

The program officer met with the new beneficiaries, who were successfully inducted into the scholarship program.
